Thank you for your interest and support of the Rural BC Project (RBCP). We would like to provide a brief update on the Project and its next steps.

Nine letters of support from Regional Districts and Municipalities were received in 2013 and the Union of BC Municipalities (UBCM) resolution supporting the Project was approved. The UBCM workshop entitled, What Does Rural BC Need to Succeed?, was well attended with over 200 delegates and government elected officials and staff.

The three Beetle Action Coalitions' Rural BC Project Steering Committee (comprised of Board members of all three Beetle Action Coalitions) met with Premier Clark, Deputy Premier Coleman, Minister Bond, Minister Bennett, Minister Thomson, Minister Oakes and the Provincial Rural Caucus at UBCM.

The Premier's address to the UBCM delegates responded to one of the five main recommendations of the RBCP.

"....and you know that if you are from a small community you have many, many champions in Victoria to help you grow your economy.But I've also heard from rural leaders this week. And so today I am charging one of the best champions that you have in Victoria, Steve Thomson, my Minister of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations, with one more job. That is to make sure that Steve is our minister specifically responsible for rural development within our government... One measure of our success will be to buck the international trend and that is to make sure a few or many years from now we can always say the rural communities in BC, unlike elsewhere in the world, are growing, they are getting younger, they are being sustained, they are getting bigger. That is one of the measures of success we will set for ourselves."

As a result of meetings between provincial government elected officials and the Rural BC Project Steering Committee, it was agreed to develop a joint BAC/government staff working group, consisting of Coalition staff and representatives from the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism & Skills Training; Ministry of Community, Sport & Cultural Development; Ministry of Social Development & Social Innovation; Ministry of Forests, Lands & Natural Resource Operations.

The primary purpose of the joint BAC/government staff working group is to encourage collaborative discussions and to develop a set of recommended actions that would further rural development in the province. The joint staff working group will provide additional information to support the on-going dialogue between the provincial government and the Rural BC Project Steering Committee.

As we continue this dialogue with the Province, we are committed to keeping rural stakeholders apprised of the Project's activities and welcome all feedback and support. Approved by Resolution #10155/78. This approved subdivision was never completed.

Application #33596 (Handley, 2000)

To subdivide the southern portion of District Lot 7194 into three lots of 8 ha each and a remainder of 24 ha. Refused by Resolution #102/2001.

After considering the information the Commission concluded as follows:

 In reviewing the previous applications, the Commission would like to reconfirm the existing approval for the 12.0 ha subdivision along the road as noted in Application #28011 correspondence.

Conclusion: Under Resolution #10155/78 the Commission previously approved the subdivision along the road.

The Commission also discussed that the proposed subdivision, resulting in a lot on both sides of the road, exceeding what was previously approved, was not conducive to agriculture.

Conclusion: The Commission is not in support of the creation of a new parcel spilt by the road resulting in a fragmented lot within the ALR.



However, the City of Trail and or the City of Rossland may assume responsibly for their sections upon a formal request (via written correspondence) to the RDKB at any time during the year. If this were to occur it is expected that activities related to sole communities taking ownership would commence in 2015.

Language reflecting this is included in the Minutes of Settlement which are attached as an addendum to the Service Establishment Bylaw.

Discussion Overall Summary of Requisition Compilation of East End Sewer Budgets

The new budgets have taken into account the infrastructure that is deemed to be sole, dual or regional benefiting for service participants.

This will provide a more accurate flow data comparison with the East End Regionalized Service flow data as future cost apportionment values will be based on relative flows of the participating communities.

The Committee members discussed how to manage the contribution from Oasis-Rivervale and if there was a way to make it retroactive in respect of the arbitrated Minutes of Settlement.

Staff explained the difficulties in providing a level of assurance that is required respecting the costs of the project. The \$4.5 Million estimate is the best cost estimate for Budget purposes regardless of what the City of Trail does with the pedestrian portion of the pipe bridge.

At present, all these larger sectors have the ability to participate and receive the benefit of differential tipping fees: \$40 – Source Separated Organic Material, v. Garbage - \$95. The SWMP may suggest that the next step may be to ban organic material.

A 'Final' list of the Joint committee will be made by March 20th. The list will separate public members from technical members.

Staff will make a request of member municipalities C.A.O.'s to recommend lead municipal staff to participate in the planning process.

5. Public Consultation Strategy

It was suggested that Open House meetings be considered in Beaver Valley and Rossland and that a meeting be held in Midway instead of Greenwood to ensure better attendance from West Boundary residents.

Staff was instructed to consider adequate geographic coverage in creating the meeting schedule.

6. Issues to be addressed in the SWMP Process

Committee recommended that the word 'closure' be added to make the second section read: "Research, analyze and evaluate financial implications of longer term (50 plus years) disposal options, including but not limited to a full commitment to zero waste, new regional landfill/expansion/closure, composting, waste to energy, exporting, mechanical recovery and other relevant strategies."

The Committee also wanted to ensure that there would be an analysis of the costs of landfill operations done in-house vs. contracted out.

7. McKelvey Creek Design Operations and Construction Plan Draft

GM Stanley noted that the draft plan indicates that the realignment of the McKelvey Creek access road may delay the final closure of the landfill for 5 years to 2098. The committee discussed the cost/benefit of this project. Stanley also noted that there are many other reasons for pursuing this project beyond the landfill space issue which remain, including maintenance costs, highway turning safety, location of recycling bins, and congestion management.

8. New Landfill Operations Regulations

GM Stanley noted that updated SWMP will contain language that will allow us to move forward on planning and implementing the SWMP knowing that the process will conclude before the new regulations take effect. The Plan will include language such as: "We commit to be in full compliance with the regulations when they come into effect".

EAST END REGIONAL SANITARY SEWER SERVICE ESTABLISHMENT BYLAW NO. 1549, 2014

A CONVERSION BYLAW TO CONVERT THE AUTHORITY FOR SANITARY SEWER TO A SERVICE

WHEREAS:

- A. By Supplementary Letters Patent dated April 22, 1969, as amended by further Supplementary Letters Patent, the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary was granted the function of undertaking the provision of interception, treatment and disposal of sanitary sewage and doing those things necessary to acquire, design, construct, operate, maintain, renew and administer sewage disposal facilities with the participating member municipalities of The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield;
- B. A dispute arose between the participating member municipalities of The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield as to the administration and operation, including the apportionment of costs, of such function, which dispute was referred to arbitration pursuant to Division 3 of Part 9 of the *Community Charter*,
- C. On January 10, 2014, the arbitrator made an award in the arbitration resolving the dispute in accordance with minutes of settlement agreed upon by the member municipalities of The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield and the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary, a copy of which award is attached as Schedule "A" to this Bylaw, and directing that bylaws be adopted to implement the award and the minutes of settlement; and
- D. For the purposes of implementing the arbitrator's award and the minutes of settlement, the Board of the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary wishes to proceed under section 774.2 of the Local Government Act and convert the service to a service exercised under the authority of a bylaw for a portion of the Regional District by bylaw under sections 774.2(3) and 796 of the Local Government Act.

NOW THEREFORE the Board of the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

1. Service

The collection, conveyance, treatment and disposal of sewage is hereby established as a service (the "Service").

2. Boundaries of Service Area

The service area is the area within the boundaries of the municipalities of The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield.

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3. Participating Areas

The participating areas for the Service consist of the member municipalities of The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield.

4. Cost Recovery

The annual operating costs and annual debt costs for the Service will be recovered by one or more of the following:

- (a) property value taxes imposed in accordance with Division 4.3 of Part 24 of the Local Government Act;
- (b) fees and charges that may be imposed under section 363 of the Local Government Act;
- (c) revenues raised by other means authorized by the Local Government Act; and
- (d) revenue received by way of agreement, enterprise, gift, grant or otherwise.

5. Cost Apportionment

- (a) In this Bylaw:
 - (i) "Abnormal Climatic Conditions" means flooding or other similar climatic conditions that for the period of those conditions cause an increase of 10% or more in the total volume of sewage entering the regional wastewater treatment plant for the period of those conditions, based on the average volume of sewage entering the plant in that same period over the previous three years. For certainty, Abnormal Climatic Conditions do not include annual freshet or other similar climatic conditions that contribute to inflow and infiltration into the sewage collection systems of any of the Participants, resulting in an increase in the volume of sewage put into the Service by any of the Participants;
 - (ii) "Benefitting Participant" means a Participant whose sewage is conveyed by a portion of the Sewage Infrastructure;
 - (iii) "Cost of the Service" means all costs, fees or expenses incurred by the Regional District arising out of or incidental to the provision of the Service, including but not limited to maintenance, repair and upgrading of Service Infrastructure, as well as administrative costs, fines, penalties, claims, legal costs or arbitration costs, and all other liabilities:
 - (iv) "Dual Benefit Cost of the Service" means those aspects of the Cost of the Service relating to capital upgrades, replacements, operation and maintenance of portions of the Service Infrastructure that convey sewage generated by only two of the Participants;
 - (v) "Participants" means The Corporation of the City of Rossland, the City of Trail and The Corporation of the Village of Warfield;
 - (vi) "Regional Benefit Cost of the Service" means the balance of the Cost of the Service after deduction of any Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and Sole Benefit Cost of the Service from the Cost of the Service:
 - (vii) "Service Infrastructure" means all necessary components, apparatus and equipment for the provision of the Service, including receiving drains, trunk sewers, pipes, mains, meters, interceptors,

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lift stations, manholes, pumping stations, storm overflows, screening chambers, and all other components of sewage disposal and treatment facilities and buildings; and

- (viii) "Sole Benefit Cost of the Service" means those aspects of the Cost of the Service relating to capital upgrades, replacements, operation and maintenance of portions of the Service Infrastructure for the Service that convey sewage generated by only one of the Participants.
- (b) The Sole Benefit Cost of the Service will be apportioned wholly to the Benefitting Participant.
- (c) The Dual Benefit Cost of the Service will be apportioned to the two Benefitting Participants as follows:
 - (i) For the calendar years 2014 and 2015, between the two Benefitting Participants based on percentages calculated using pro-rata ratios of the respective percentages for the two Benefitting Participants specified in section 5(d)(i) below;
 - (ii) For the calendar year 2016, between the two Benefitting Participants based on the relative volume of sewage each of the two Benefitting Participants put into the Service in the year 2015; and
 - (iii) For the calendar year 2017 and after, between the two Benefitting Participants based on the relative volume of sewage that each of the two Benefiting Participants puts into the Service during the preceding calendar year.
- (d) The Regional Benefit Cost of the Service will be apportioned between the Participants as follows:
 - (i) For the calendar years 2014 and 2015, based on the following percentages:

A. Trail 62.56%B. Rossland 24.90%

C. Warfield 12.54%

- (ii) For the calendar year 2016, based on the relative volume of sewage each of the Participants put into the Service in the year 2015; and
- (iii) For the calendar year 2017 and after, based on the relative volume of sewage that each of the Participants puts into the Service during the preceding calendar year.
- (e) Subject to section 803.1 of the Local Government Act, any liabilities and associated costs arising as a direct or indirect result of any decision made in respect of the administration and operation of those portions of the Service Infrastructure referred to in sections 5(b) and (c) above, shall be apportioned wholly to the Benefitting Participants, and no portion of those liabilities or their associated costs will be payable either by the Participants who are not Benefitting Participants or by the Regional District as a whole.

6. Voting

Voting on all resolutions, bylaws or other matters respecting the administration and operation of all portions of the Service Infrastructure shall be in accordance with Section 791(4) of the Local Government Act. For voting on resolutions or bylaws or other matters respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the

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Service Infrastructure referred to in section 5(d) above, the director of each participant has the number of votes assigned to that director under section 783(2) of the *Local Government Act*. For voting on resolutions or bylaws or other matters respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the Service Infrastructure referred to in section 5(c) above, the directors of the two Benefitting Participants have 10 votes assigned between them in the same proportions as the apportionment of the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service under section 5(c) above, rounded to the nearest whole number, and the director of the other Participant has one vote. For voting on resolutions or bylaws or other matters respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the Service Infrastructure referred to in section 5(b) above, the director of the Benefitting Participant has nine votes and the directors of the other Participants each have one vote.

7. Maximum requisition

The maximum amount that may be requisitioned under section 800.1(1) of the Local Government Act for the service will be the greater of:

- (a) One million nine hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$1,920,000) dollars; or
- (b) an amount equal to the amount that could be raised by a property value tax of one dollars and nineteen cents (\$1.19) per one thousand (\$1,000.00) dollars which when applied to the net taxable value of land and improvements within the service area will yield the maximum amount that may be requisitioned under sections 803(1)(a) and (b) for the Service.

8. Powers

In providing the Service established by this bylaw, the Regional District may, without limiting the generality of section 1:

- (a) acquire, design, construct, operate, maintain, renew and administer all aspects of the Service Infrastructure;
- (b) enter into an agreement with a Participant on such terms as are mutually agreed upon providing that the Participant municipality may undertake on behalf of the Regional District the design, construction, operation and maintenance of any of the facilities of the Regional District within that municipality;
- (c) make interim provision for sewage disposal;
- (d) at any time enter upon any lands, streets, waters or water courses, without the consent of the owner, for the purpose of making surveys and other examinations to determine whether or not the lands, streets, waters or water courses are required in the carrying out of the Service;
- (e) carry any Service Infrastructure or other works through, across or under any street in such manner as not unnecessarily to obstruct or impede travel and may enter upon and dig up any street for the purpose of laying sewers, or other works and aspects of the Service Infrastructure and of maintaining, repairing and renewing the Service Infrastructure in accordance with the following:
 - in entering upon and digging up any street, the Regional District shall be subject to such reasonable terms and conditions as may be made by the authority having jurisdiction over such street;
 - (ii) before entering upon any street for the purpose of laying, maintaining, repairing or renewing a sewer or other works, the Regional District gives at least 30 days' notice of its contemplated

- action to the authority having jurisdiction over the street, but the authority may waive the giving of such notice or shorten the notice period; and
- (iii) whenever the Regional District digs up any street for any of the purposes set out above, it shall, so far as practicable, restore the street to as good a condition as the street was in before such digging began, and the Regional District shall at all times indemnify and save harmless the municipality within which such digging occurred against and from all damage which may be recovered against such municipality by reason of anything done or omitted by the Regional District, and shall reimburse the municipality for all expenses which the municipality may incur by reason of any defect or want of repair of any street caused by the construction, maintenance, repair or renewal of any of the sewers, drains or other works. No compensation other than as provided in this subsection shall be made by the Regional District in respect of anything done by the Regional District under this subsection;
- (f) make regulations for the purpose of:
 - (i) minimizing the entry of surface and rainwater taking into account the condition of the sewers;
 - (ii) controlling the quantity and quality of sewage discharging into its facilities;
 - (iii) carry out investigations to assess discharges and contaminant sources; and
 - (iv) coordinate programs among all levels of government to enhance environmental protection.

9. Additional Steps

The implementation of the arbitrator's award and the minutes of settlement requires additional steps to be taken outside of the adoption of this bylaw and may require the future amendment of this bylaw. Should a dispute arise as to the implementation of the arbitrator's award and the minutes of settlement, the arbitrator has jurisdiction to resolve such disputes, including jurisdiction to resolve issues around the additional steps to be taken outside the adoption of this bylaw and to direct that this bylaw be amended.

10. Sole Authority

The Regional District is the sole authority with jurisdiction to construct the works referred to in section 8(a) above, provided that a Participant may proceed on its own initiative with any such work within its own boundaries that the Regional Board is unable or unwilling to construct at that time, the design of such work having been approved in advance by the Regional District.

11. Continuing Authority

Nothing in this bylaw will be interpreted as affecting or impairing in any way the rights and powers of the Regional District under the Supplementary Letters Patent, dated April 22, 1969, as amended by further Supplementary Letters Patent, in relation to that part of the Regional District not contained within the service area created by this bylaw.

12. Citation

This bylaw may be cited as the "East End Regional Sanitary Sewer Service Establishment Bylaw No. 1549, 2014".

CONSENT AWARD

Having reviewed the terms of Minutes of Settlement agreed upon by the parties (attached to this Award for reference as Schedule "A"), which terms are to be incorporated into an Award in the Arbitration, and after hearing from the parties on a conference call held at 3:30 p.m. on Wednesday, January 8, 2014, and by consent;

I, as Arbitrator, award as follows:

Apportionment Principles

1. In this Award, subject to section 803.1 of the Local Government Act, "Cost of the Service" means all costs, fees or expenses incurred by the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary (the "Regional District") arising out of or incidental to its provision of the service of the interception, treatment and disposal of sanitary sewage ("the Service") to the member municipalities of the City of Trail ("Trail"), the City of Rossland ("Rossland"), and the Village of Warfield ("Warfield), (collectively, the "Participants"), which costs, fees, and expenses include but are not limited to maintenance, repair, upgrading, administrative, fines, penalties, claims, legal, or arbitration costs, and all other liabilities.

- In this Award, "Abnormal Climatic Conditions" means flooding or other similar climatic conditions that for the period of those conditions cause an increase of 10% or more in the total volume of sewage entering the regional wastewater treatment plant for the period of those conditions, based on the average volume of sewage entering the plant in that same period over the previous three years. For certainty, Abnormal Climatic Conditions do not include annual freshet or other similar climatic conditions that contribute to inflow and infiltration into the sewage collection systems of any of the Participants, resulting in an increase in the volume of sewage put into the Service by any of the Participants.
- 3. For the year 2014 and after, the Cost of the Service shall be apportioned between the Participants on the following principles:
 - (a) Firstly, the Cost of the Service relating to capital upgrades, replacements, operation and maintenance of portions of the infrastructure for the Service that convey sewage generated by only one of the Participants (the "Sole Benefit Cost of the Service") be apportioned wholly to that Participant;
 - (b) Secondly, the Cost of the Service relating to capital upgrades, replacements, operation and maintenance of portions of the infrastructure for the Service that convey sewage generated by two but not the third of the Participants (the "Dual Benefit Cost of the Service") be apportioned between the two benefiting Participants on the basis of the relative volume of sewage that each of the two benefiting Participants puts into the Service; and,
 - (c) Finally, the remaining Cost of the Service (the "Regional Benefit Cost of the Service") be apportioned between the Participants on the basis of the relative volume of sewage that each of the Participants puts into the Service.
- 4. As soon as practicable, the Regional District shall provide to the Participants its determination of which portions of the infrastructure for the Service benefit only one of the Participants and which of the Participants those portions benefit, and its determination of which portions of the infrastructure for the Service benefit two but not the third of the Participants and which of the Participants those portions benefit. Each Participant shall, within 14 days of receipt of the Regional District's determinations, advise the Regional District and the other Participants of any objections that Participant has to the determinations along with an explanation of the basis of each objection. After receiving all such objections, the Participants shall either agree on an appropriate resolution of the objections or the objections will be referred for resolution by me in the Arbitration.

5. Recognizing that the Service does not currently include the necessary equipment to allow the Regional District to accurately determine the relative volume of sewage that each of the Participants puts into the Service (the "Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment"), in order to apportion the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service and Dual Benefit Cost of the Service as required above, for the years 2014 and 2015, the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service shall initially be apportioned between the Participants on the following percentages:

(a) Trail:

62.56%;

(b) Rossland:

24.90%; and,

(c) Warfield:

12.54%,

and the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service shall initially be apportioned between the two benefiting Participants on the basis of their relative percentages set out above.

- 6. In 2014, the Regional District shall, as part of the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service, cause to be undertaken a study of the Service by a qualified consultant in relation to the design and installation of the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment and shall take all reasonable steps necessary to cause the equipment to be installed in a timely manner. In doing so, the Regional District shall consult with the Participants as to the consultant chosen to undertake the study, and as to the results of the study prior to implementing the consultant's recommendations in the study. After the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment is installed, the Regional District shall, as part of the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service, take all reasonable steps necessary to maintain the equipment in a manner to ensure its greatest accuracy in measuring the volumes of sewage that each Participant puts into the Service. It is possible that the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment may have a margin of error in the range of ±5%.
- 7. The Regional District shall make all reasonable efforts to install, by no later than January 1, 2015, the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment, such that by January 1, 2016 the Regional District will have sufficient accurate volume data from the equipment from the preceding 12 month period to apportion, for the year 2016, the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service on the basis described in paragraphs 3(b) and 3(c) respectively above. For the year 2017 and after, the volume data from the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment from the preceding 12 month period for each year shall be used to apportion the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service for that year on the basis described in paragraphs 3(b) and 3(c) respectively above.

- By June 30, 2016, the Regional District and the Participants shall undertake a 8. reapportionment of the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service for each of the years 2014 and 2015. This reapportionment shall be undertaken on the basis that the volumes of sewage that each of the Participants put into the Service in 2015 (which volumes were utilized to apportion the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service for the year 2016) being deemed to be the volumes of sewage that each of the Participants put into the Service in each of the years 2014 and 2015. Upon that reapportionment being undertaken, the Regional District and the Participants shall determine the difference between the portion of the total Cost of the Service that was initially apportioned to and paid by each Participant for each year and the amount that would have been apportioned to and paid by each Participant under the reapportionment for each year, and the Participants shall undertake an accounting as between them to bring their respective initial payments for each year into line with the payments that they would have paid for each year under the reapportionment. All payments necessary between the Participants to complete the accounting shall be made by no later than September 30, 2016.
- 9. For the purposes of apportionment for the year 2016 and after, and for the purposes of the reapportionments for the years 2014 and 2015, as soon as practicable the Regional District shall provide to the Participants the volume data for each of the Participants for the preceding 12 month period. In the event of Abnormal Climatic Conditions, the Regional District shall advise the Participants of any volume data that it intends to exclude from its apportionment calculations on the basis that the data is inaccurate due to Abnormal Climatic Conditions. Each Participant shall, within 14 days of receipt of the Regional District's advice as to the exclusion of volume data, advise the Regional District and the other Participants of any objections that Participant has to the advice along with an explanation of the basis of each objection. After receiving all such objections, the Participants shall either agree on an appropriate resolution of the objections or the the objections will be referred for resolution by me in the Arbitration.
- 10. There may be increases in the Cost of the Service by reason of the terms of this Award. Some aspects of the Cost of the Service that may increase as a result will need to be estimated by the Regional District for budgeting purposes. Those estimates will be approved by the Participants and the Regional District Board through the normal budget approval process (the "Estimates").

Reserves

11. The Regional District shall administer the existing reserve fund in relation to the Service from the year 2014 and after as a reserve fund in relation to the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service.

Conversion Bylaw

- 12. The Regional District shall adopt a bylaw or bylaws for the purpose of converting the Service to one exercised under the authority of an establishing bylaw (the "Conversion Bylaw"). The Conversion Bylaw shall include provisions for the apportionment of costs as set out in this Award. In addition, and to the extent authorized by section 800.2(1)(b) of the Local Government Act, the Conversion Bylaw shall provide that:
 - in relation to resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation (a) of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service referred to in either paragraphs 3(a) or 3(b) of these Minutes of Settlement, the number of votes allocated to each Participant shall reasonably and fairly reflect their responsibility for the costs of those portions of the Infrastructure. By way of example, where costs are allocated in accordance with paragraph 3(a), the Participant who pays the Sole Benefit Cost of the Service shall be entitled to the majority of votes on resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation of such portions of the infrastructure of the Service, and where costs are allocated in accordance with paragraph 3(b), the Participants who pay the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service shall between them be entitled to exercise the majority of votes respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, in proportion to their respective responsibility for the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service. The Conversion Bylaw shall confirm that voting on all resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation of all other portions of the infrastructure of the Service shall be in accordance with Section 791(4)(b) of the Local Government Act; and
 - (b) subject to section 803.1 of the *Local Government Act*, any liabilities and associated costs arising as a direct or indirect result of any decision made in respect of the administration and operation of those portions of the infrastructure of the service referred to in paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) shall be apportioned in the same manner as the other Costs of the Service for those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, in other words, solely to the Participant or among the Participants responsible under paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) for the Costs of the Service of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, and no portion of those liabilities or their associated costs will be payable by the Participants who are not responsible under paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) for the Costs of the Service of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service or by the Regional District as a whole.

- 13. The terms of the Conversion Bylaw shall be subject to the approval of each of the Participants, but if such approval cannot be obtained within 30 days of a draft Conversion Bylaw being circulated to each of the Participants, I shall settle the terms of the Conversion Bylaw in accordance with this Award.
- 14. Subject to the adoption of any necessary bylaw by the Regional District, the Sewer Committee voting structure shall be revised to parallel the provisions of section 12(a) of this Award.

Implementation

- 15. If due to circumstances beyond the Regional District's control, and despite making all reasonable efforts, the Regional District is unable to complete the installation of the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment in the Service by January 1, 2015, the Regional District and the Participants shall agree to a reasonable extension of time for the completion of the installation, and failing such agreement, the issue of extending the time for completion of the installation shall be referred to me in the Arbitration.
- 16. In the event of an extension of time under section 15, the time for reapportionment of the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service under section 8 of this Award shall also be extended by agreement of the Regional District and the Participants, or failing such agreement, at my direction in the Arbitration.
- 17. The Regional District and the Participants have leave to refer to me any dispute that arises in relation to the implementation of this Award or the underlying Minutes of Settlement for resolution in the Arbitration, with me retaining my current jurisdiction in the Arbitration, in accordance with the *Community Charter*.
- 18. All parties agree that if I am unwilling or unable to act as Arbitrator when required, and if the parties are not able to agree on a substitute arbitrator, any party may ask the Dispute Resolution Officer to appoint a substitute Arbitrator and the substitute Arbitrator shall for the purposes of the Settlement Agreement thereafter be considered to be the "Arbitrator."

General

19. Nothing in this Award affects the powers of the Regional District and the Participants under the *Local Government Act* to agree upon a different method for apportioning the

total Cost of the Service and implementing that agreement in accordance with the procedures set out in the *Local Government Act*.

MINUTES OF SETTLEMENT

Whereas:

- A. In or about 1968, the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary (the "Regional District") was issued Supplementary Letters Patent (the "SLP") authorizing it to undertake the provision of interception, treatment and disposal of sanitary sewage (the "Service"), with only the member municipalities of the City of Trail ("Trail"), the City of Rossland ("Rossland"), and the Village of Warfield ("Warfield"), (collectively, the "Participants"), participating in, and sharing in the cost of, the service;
- B. The SLP provided that the cost of the Service was to be apportioned between the Participants, with Trail being responsible for 68.95% of the cost, Rossland being responsible for 20.91% of the cost, and Warfield being responsible for 10.14% of the cost;
- C. The percentages for apportioning the cost of the Service specified in the SLP were established on the basis of the relative projected future populations for each of the Participants to the overall design population for the Service, adjusted to reduce the capital contributions of Rossland and Warfield;

- D. The Participants have, for a number of years, been attempting to negotiate a new basis for apportioning the cost of the Service between the Participants but were unable to do so;
- E. The dispute between the Participants as to an appropriate basis for apportioning the cost of the Service between the Participants (the "Dispute") was referred to arbitration pursuant to the provisions of the *Community Charter* (the "Arbitration"); and,
- F. The Participants, with the support of the Regional District, have agreed to resolve the Dispute on the terms and conditions set out in these Minutes of Settlement,

Trail, Rossland, Warfield, and the Regional District, for the consideration of the promises exchanged below, agree with each other as follows:

Apportionment Principles

- In these Minutes of Settlement, subject to section 803.1 of the Local Government Act, it
 is understood and accepted by the Participants that "Cost of the Service" means all

- 8. By June 30, 2016, the Regional District and the Participants shall undertake a reapportionment of the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service for each of the years 2014 and 2015. This reapportionment shall be undertaken on the basis that the volumes of sewage that each of the Participants put into the Service in 2015 (which volumes were utilized to apportion the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service for the year 2016) being deemed to be the volumes of sewage that each of the Participants put into the Service in each of the years 2014 and 2015. Upon that reapportionment being undertaken, the Regional District and the Participants shall determine the difference between the portion of the total Cost of the Service that was initially apportioned to and paid by each Participant for each year and the amount that would have been apportioned to and paid by each Participant under the reapportionment for each year, and the Participants shall undertake an accounting as between them to bring their respective initial payments for each year into line with the payments that they would have paid for each year under the reapportionment. All payments necessary between the Participants to complete the accounting shall be made by no later than September 30, 2016.

It is understood and accepted by the Participants that there may be increases in the Cost of the Service by reason of the terms of these Minutes of Settlement, and that some aspects of the Cost of the Service that may increase as a result will need to be estimated by the Regional District for budgeting purposes, and that those estimates will be approved by the Participants and the Regional District Board through the normal budget approval process (the "Estimates").

Reserves

11. The Regional District shall administer the existing reserve fund in relation to the Service from the year 2014 and after as a reserve fund in relation to the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service.

Conversion Bylaw

- 12. The Regional District shall prepare a bylaw or bylaws for the purpose of converting the Service to one exercised under the authority of an establishing bylaw (the "Conversion Bylaw") to be reviewed by the Participants. The Conversion Bylaw shall include provisions for the apportionment of costs that reflect the intention of the Participants as set out in these Minutes of Settlement. In addition, and to the extent authorized by section 800.2(1)(b) of the Local Government Act, the Conversion Bylaw shall provide that:
 - (a) in relation to resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service referred to in either paragraphs 3(a) or 3(b) of these Minutes of Settlement, the number of votes allocated to each Participant shall reasonably and fairly reflect their responsibility for the costs of those portions of the Infrastructure. By way of example, where costs are allocated in accordance with paragraph 3(a), the Participant who pays the Sole Benefit Cost of the Service shall be entitled to the

majority of votes on resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation of such portions of the infrastructure of the Service, and where costs are allocated in accordance with paragraph 3(b), the Participants who pay the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service shall between them be entitled to exercise the majority of votes respecting the administration and operation of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, in proportion to their respective responsibility for the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service. The Conversion Bylaw shall confirm that voting on all resolutions or bylaws respecting the administration and operation of all other portions of the infrastructure of the Service shall be in accordance with Section 791(4)(b) of the Local Government Act; and,

- (b) subject to section 803.1 of the *Local Government Act*, any liabilities and associated costs arising as a direct or indirect result of any decision made in respect of the administration and operation of those portions of the infrastructure of the service referred to in paragraph 3(a) and 3(b) shall be apportioned in the same manner as the other Costs of the Service for those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, in other words, solely to the Participant or among the Participants responsible under paragraph 3(a) and 3(b) for the Costs of the Service of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service, and no portion of those liabilities or their associated costs will be payable by the Participants who are not responsible under paragraph 3(a) or 3(b) for the Costs of the Service of those portions of the infrastructure of the Service or by the Regional District as a whole.
- 13. The terms of the Conversion Bylaw shall be subject to the approval of each of the Participants, but if such approval cannot be obtained within 30 days of a draft Conversion Bylaw being circulated to each of the Participants, the Arbitrator shall settle the terms of the Conversion Bylaw in accordance with these Minutes of Settlement.
- 14. Subject to the adoption of any necessary bylaw by the Regional District, the Sewer Committee voting structure shall be revised to parallel the provisions of section 12(a) of these Minutes of Settlement.

Implementation

- 15. These Minutes of Settlement shall be implemented by order of the Arbitrator in the Arbitration.
- 16. It is understood and agreed by the Participants that if due to circumstances beyond the Regional District's control, and despite making all reasonable efforts, the Regional District is unable to complete the installation of the Necessary Volume Measuring Equipment in the Service by January 1, 2015, the Regional District and the Participants shall agree to a reasonable extension of time for the completion of the installation, and

failing such agreement, the issue of extending the time for completion of the installation shall be referred to the Arbitrator for resolution in the Arbitration in accordance with these Minutes of Settlement.

- 17. It is further understood and agreed that in the event of an extension of time under section 16, the time for reapportionment of the Dual Benefit Cost of the Service and the Regional Benefit Cost of the Service under section 8 of these Minutes of Settlement shall also be extended by agreement of the Regional District and the Participants, or failing such agreement, at the direction of the Arbitrator in the Arbitration.
- 18. The order of the Arbitrator in the Arbitration shall include leave for any dispute that arises in relation to the implementation of these Minutes of Settlement to be referred to the Arbitrator for resolution in the Arbitration, with the Arbitrator retaining his current jurisdiction in the Arbitration, in accordance with the *Community Charter*.

General

- 19. Nothing in these Minutes of Settlement affects the powers of the Regional District and the Participants under the *Local Government Act* of the Regional District to agree upon a different method for apportioning the total Cost of the Service and implementing that agreement in accordance with the procedures set out in the *Local Government Act*.
- 20. Time is of the essence in these Minutes of Settlement.
- 21. It is understood and agreed that these Minutes of Settlement may be executed in any number of counterparts and that faxed or emailed signatures are deemed to be original signatures. All counterparts shall be construed together and constitute one and the same Minutes of Settlement.



Issue Introduction

A Staff Report from Theresa Lenardon, Executive Assistant regarding the replacement of former Director Duclos as one of two RDKB Board Appointments to the CBT Local Government Governance Committee.

History/Background Factors

In January 2013, the RDKB Board received a letter from Greg Deck, Chair, CBT Board of Directors advising that the CBT was creating a Local Government Governance Committee to examine the governance relationship between the CBT and its partners. Mr. Deck also advised that the CBT was requesting the RDKB Board of Directors to appoint two of its members to sit on this Committee.

In addition to other tasks, the CBT Local Government Governance Committee is responsible for assessing how the Local Governments' process for nominating members to the CBT Board could be integrated with the Provincial Government's process.

The Board reviewed a Staff Report (attached) at the January 31, 2013 Board meeting respecting this matter and through secret ballot, the Board appointed Directors Crockett and Duclos to the CBT Governance Committee.

Since the Board appointments were made on January 31, 2013, Director Duclos is no longer on the RDKB Board of Directors. Therefore, the Board needs to appoint a Director to replace him on the CBT Local Government Governance Committee.

Implications

There are no financial implications in appointing another RDKB Board Director to replace former Director Duclos.

Issue Introduction

A staff report from Theresa Lenardon, Executive Assistant dated January 23, 2013 regarding a proposal from the CBT to create a committee to examine the governance relationship between the CBT and its Regional Districts and Ktunaxa Nation Council partners.

History/Background Factors

Further to a letter from the CBT Board Chair, G. Deck, dated January 15, 2013 (attached), the CBT has invited its partners, the Regional Districts and the Ktunaxa Nation Council (collectively known as "Local Governments"), to consider participating in the establishment of a committee that would examine the governance relationship between the Local Government partners and the CBT itself.

The CBT is requesting that the RDKB appoint 2 representatives to the proposed committee, which would be responsible for drafting Terms of Reference that would include, in addition to other items, assessing how the Local Governments' process for nominating members to the CBT Board could be integrated with the Provincial Government's process pursuant to the following Parts of the *Columbia Basin Trust Act* (attached):

Part 5 - Directors

• Specifically ensuring an appropriate mix of Board skills and attributes (e.g.

"qualified" local government appointees)

Part 6 - Appointment of Directors

- Specifically the timing of the nomination of the RDKB Director to the CBT Board, and again
- Specifically ensuring an appropriate mix of Board skills and attributes (e.g. "qualified" local government appointees)

Part 8 - Replacement of Directors & Part 8.1 Term of Office of Directors

• Specifically the Length of Appointment to CBT Board

Currently, the RDKB has followed the Provincial process pursuant to the above-noted parts of the CBT Act .

It is important to note that although the RDKB adopts a resolution to appoint its CBT Board member based on a recommendation from the Policy, Executive and Personnel (PEP) Committee, the actual formal and legislative appointment is made by the Lieutenant Governor in Council pursuant to Parts 5 and 6 of the *Act*.

Gord DeRosa, Councillor, City of Trail is the present RDKB appointee to the CBT Board . His term commenced April 1, 2012 and will expire March 31, 2014. In 2012, the RDKB Board of Directors, through the Policy, Executive and Personnel Committee (PEP) followed the Provincial process in nominating Mr. DeRosa.

It is not clear if this request requires the appointment of a RDKB Board Director or the appointment of a representative from the RDKB jurisdiction.

Implications

There would be no financial implications.

Should the Board support this initiative and agree to appoint 2 RDKB Board Directors to this CBT committee, those RDKB Board members would experience additional responsibility and work and would also have to attend more meetings (CBT meeting).

Membership on the committee would keep the RDKB knowledgeable with respect to effective and responsible governance with the CBT Board and in general. Through the 2 appointees, this could also be an opportunity to develop networks, contacts and ideas for future projects and initiatives that would benefit the overall RDKB jurisdiction.

Improve and Enhance Communication: We will continue to focus on partnerships that advance the interests of the Region.

Columbia Basin Trust (CBT) was born out of the efforts of local governments. We acknowledge how important it is to maintain this strong working relationship.

In that spirit, we would like to establish a committee to examine the governance relationship between Regional Districts and the Ktunaxa Nation Council (collectively "Local Governments") and CBT. We would like to suggest that the committee be comprised of:

- two representatives from Regional District of Kootenay Boundary;
- · two representatives from Regional District of Central Kootenay;
- · two representatives from Regional District of East Kootenay;
- · two representatives from Columbia Shuswap Regional District;
- one representative from Regional District of Fraser-Fort George;
- · one or two representatives from the Ktunaxa Nation Council; and
- · two representatives from CBT's Board.

The committee's terms of reference would include, but not necessarily be limited to, assessing how the Local Governments' process for nominating members to CBT's Board could be integrated with the provincial government's process (for example, with regard to timing of nominations, length of appointments and ensuring an appropriate mix of Board skills and attributes is maintained). 5 Directors

- **5** (1) The Lieutenant Governor in Council is to appoint, as the board of directors of the corporation, 12 qualified individuals of whom
 - (a) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the board of the Regional District of Central Kootenay,
 - (b) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the board of the Fraser-Fort George Regional District,
 - (c) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the board of the Columbia Shuswap Regional District,
 - (d) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the board of the Kootenay Boundary Regional District,
 - (e) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the board of the East Kootenay Regional District, and
 - (f) one is to be appointed from the nominees provided under section 6 by the tribal council.
- (2) Despite subsection (1), the Lieutenant Governor in Council may decline to appoint any of the nominees provided by a nominating body and, in that event,
 - (a) the minister must notify the nominating body of the Lieutenant Governor in Council's decision, and
 - (b) the nominating body is, within 60 days after that notification, to provide to the Lieutenant Governor in Council a list of at least one and not more than 4 nominees who are qualified individuals.
- (3) If a nominating body does not comply with subsection (2) (b), or if the Lieutenant Governor in Council declines to appoint any of the nominees provided by the nominating body under that subsection, the Lieutenant Governor in Council is to appoint a qualified individual as director, and that director is deemed to be appointed from nominees of that nominating body provided under section 6.
- (4) No act or proceeding of the directors is invalid merely because the composition of the board does not accord with subsection (1).

6 Appointment of directors

- **6** (1) Each of the nominating bodies is, at least 60 days before the expiry of the term of office of the director appointed from its nominees, to provide to the Lieutenant Governor in Council a list of at least one and not more than 4 nominees who are qualified individuals.
- (2) A nominating body may nominate an existing director for successive terms of office.
- (3) If a nominating body does not comply with subsection (1), the Lieutenant Governor in Council is to appoint a qualified individual to hold office as director after the expiry of the term

of office of the director appointed from the nominees of that nominating body, and the director appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council under this subsection is deemed to be appointed from nominees provided by that nominating body under this section.

7 Removal of directors

7 The Lieutenant Governor in Council may remove any director after receiving a written request to do so from

- (a) the minister, or
- (b) the board of directors.

8-Replacement of directors

- **8** (1) If a director who was appointed from the nominees of a nominating body dies, resigns or is removed, the nominating body must, within 60 days, provide to the Lieutenant Governor in Council a list of at least one and not more than 4 nominees who are qualified individuals and the Lieutenant Governor in Council is to appoint as the replacement director, one of the nominees from the submitted list.
- (2) Despite subsection (1), the Lieutenant Governor in Council may decline to appoint any of the nominees provided by a nominating body and, in that event,
 - (a) the minister must notify the nominating body of the Lieutenant Governor in Council's decision, and
 - (b) the nominating body is, within 60 days after that notification, to provide to the Lieutenant Governor in Council a list of at least 2 and not more than 4 nominees who are qualified individuals.
- (3) If a nominating body does not comply with subsection (1) or (2) (b), as the case may be, or if the Lieutenant Governor in Council declines to appoint any of the nominees provided by the nominating body under subsection (1) or (2) (b), as the case may be, the Lieutenant Governor in Council is to appoint a qualified individual as the replacement director, and that director is deemed to be appointed from nominees of that nominating body provided under section 6.
- (4) Subject to section 8.1, a replacement director appointed under this section holds office until the end of the term of office of the replaced director.

8.1 Term of office of directors

8.1 A director appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council under this Act is appointed for the term of office and on the terms and conditions the Lieutenant Governor in Council considers appropriate, and the Lieutenant Governor in Council may select a different term of office and different terms and conditions for each director appointed under this Act.





Attached is a floor plan for the lean-to structures that I was adding onto my existing barn. The northern addition is for a hay shed and the southern one is for a loafing area. Both are low human occupancy areas. Some additional information is as follows:


- 1. The existing barn has a substantial concrete perimeter foundation.
- 2. Dirt floors will maintained in all areas
- 3. The new areas will not have any perimeter enclosure walls. The hay shed however will have wire netting and a gate to keep out animals.
- 4. A retaining wall has been built along on the west side of the hay shed with 100 interlocking Allan blocks, with a maximum height of 5ft by the barn and tapering down to a 2ft. flanking wall on the north side.
- 5. Both new structures are supported by 6 ½" pressure treated posts, five on the north side and three on the south side which are buried 3-4 feet into the ground.
- 6. 6x6" inch cross beams are secured to the top side of the posts by framing brackets on both sides.
- 7. 6x2" lean-to rafters are placed at 16" centers from the cross beams, where they are secured by hurricane straps, across to the existing barn where they are nailed into the existing rafters.
- 8. 4x2" cross purlins will be nailed across the rafters at 12' centres upon which the galvanized metal panels will be fastened. We are considering installing snow breaks.
- 9. The slope on the northern lean-to is an average of 7' on the underside of the cross beams to 12' under the end of the rafters as they join into the existing barn. The comparable dimensions on the south side where the ground is slightly higher are 7' and 11ft 6" respectively.


Both myself and my contractor, Les Jackman were completely unaware that building permission may be required for lean-to additions to an existing farm building structure. That being said I want to fully comply with all applicable RDKB bylaws. As I have mentioned time is of the essence because we have taken in 7 rescue horses in addition to our existing stock, and our hay is being held for us temporarily at the farm where we have it reserved. 2 and whiter is approaching! Atco Wood Products wishes to add more Crown land to their operating area. No details are provided regarding estimated cuts, dates, access, as it is too early to consider these factors.

IMPLICATIONS

The proposed area is Crown land. The area is designated 'Rural Resource 2' in the Area 'A' Official Community Plan and is zoned 'Rural Conservation' (RC) in the Area A' Zoning Bylaw.

The OCP policies (Section 16.5) for permitted uses on Rural Resource 2 lands include: resource extraction, forestry, natural resource management and related land uses. The RC Zoning permits resource uses. Even if not permitted by the zoning, certain provincially authorized resource development activities (forestry, mining) cannot be restricted by local government bylaws.

Part of the proposed area is near the urban interface with the City of Trail, and recreational trails and uses in Area 'A'. If this area is included in the operating area for Atco, there is a possibility of logging or logging related activities near recreation areas or residential neighbourhoods (see Ortho Photo). If the application proceeds further, potential conflict issues can be addressed through the permitting process.







ISSUE INTRODUCTION

FrontCounterBC has invited the Regional District of Kootenay Boundary to comment on an application for a license of occupation submitted to the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO) by the Kettle River Mountain Bikers Association. The applicant seeks recreational trail tenure under the Forest and Range Practices Act for a mountain bike trail on the east side of Christina Lake *(see Trail Map)*.

PROPOSAL

The applicant seeks authorization under Section 57 of the Forest and Range Practices Act to construct and maintain a recreational trail on Crown land, and designation under Section 56 of the Act for the land as a recreational trail. The proposed trail, to be named the "Dave Swetland Memorial Baker Creek Trail", will be a 3.7km non-commercial, non-exclusive trail built and maintained for mountain biking opportunities.

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Wherever possible, the trail will be located on rocky open areas and through aspen patches. It will be designed to not impact future timber harvesting activities in the area. The trail head will be accessed from the Fife Road and Baker Creek FSR. It will come out below onto the Trans-Canada Trail railgrade (see FrontCounter Referral).

IMPLICATIONS

The Crown land under application is designated 'Natural Resource' in the Area 'C' Official Community Plan and zoned 'Natural Resource 1' (NR 1) in the Area 'C' Zoning Bylaw. This proposal does not comport to the permitted uses in the NR 1 Zone. Section 302 of the Area 'C' Zoning Bylaw does, though, state that "parks, playgrounds and similar active or passive recreational areas ..." are permitted in all zones. Also, the management and designation of trails on Crown land is within the authority of the Provincial government.

The tenure requested is non-exclusive. Thus, Section 56 and 57 authorizations along the lines suggested in the application would not restrict other users of the trails.

ADVISORY PLANNING COMMISSION COMMENTS

The Area 'C' APC provided the following comments:

- Signage should be placed where the new trails meets existing trails, making people aware of the change.
- Liability. Who is responsible for fire, etc? Also, property owners in the area (Barg and Swetland) want to make sure they are not liable for anything with the trail that passes through their property.
- Make sure no trees are cut on woodlots to make trails.
- Trail users need to be aware that active logging can occur throughout the year and take appropriate safety measures.
- The trail should be named the "Dave Swetland Memorial Trail" and not the longer "Dave Swetland Memorial Baker Creek Trail".

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT COMNMENTS

The Ministry confirms that the application is entirely on Crown land. There is no private land involved. If there is a woodlot license in the area, the terms of the license agreement are not changed by any recreational tenure issued. Woodlot licenses grant the license holder the exclusive right to manage and harvest Crown timber within the woodlot license area.

Regarding liability, the Ministry advises that there is no liability to third parties if the recreational trail tenure or designation is approved. The applicant (Kettle River Mountain Bikers Association) is issued insurance by the Province as part of the process.

On signage and the trail name, the parties can work that out as part of the process.

ISSUE INTRODUCTION

ISSUE INTRODUCTION

Geoff Furniss has submitted an application to exclude land from the Agricultural Land Reserve. The parcel is on the west side of Hulme Creek Road (see Site Location Map).

HISTORY / BACKGROUND FACTORS

This parcel is partially within the ALR. The ALR portion runs along the east side of the parcel, up against Hulme Creek Road. The ALR portion is about 15-20% of the parcel.

In 2009, the applicant received approval from the ALC to subdivide the parcels into 5 4ha lots, with a large remainder. In 2010 the ALC revised the approval to allow an additional 1.6 ha lot to be created from the large remainder *(see Prior ALR Subdivision Proposal)*. However, the subdivision was never finalized and the parcel remains intact. The applicant is now seeking to exclude the ALR land from the parcel, making the entire parcel not in the ALR.

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Current Uses on the Land:

The applicants list the following current uses:

- Bare land - not currently in use

Adjacent Land Uses:

The applicants list the adjacent land uses as follows:

North - Homesite

East - Immediately is Hulme Creek Road, then various homesites

South - Homesite West - Homesite

Agricultural Capability Mapping:

The Agricultural Capability Mapping for the area indicates that there are 2 different ratings for the parcel. The vast majority of the ALR land is Class 6, limited by topography and shallow soil or bedrock outcroppings. A small portion of the ALR land, in the southeast corner, is 80% Class 5, limited by soil moisture deficiency, topography and shallow soil or bedrock outcroppings and 20% Class 6, limited by topography and shallow soil or bedrock outcroppings. Even with improvements, these capability classes do not improve (see Agriculture Land Capability Map).

Under this rating system, the classifications range from Class 1 which has no significant limitations on crops, to Class 7 which has no capability for arable culture or permanent pasture.

This agricultural land capability information and the map were prepared from information generated by Herb Luttmerding, P. Ag., as part of the professional services he provided in developing the Boundary Agricultural Area Plan. This information may differ some from the agricultural capability mapping information generated by the Province. If the application is forwarded to the ALC, they will use the information they deem most appropriate in their determination of agricultural capability, whether it be this, their own mapping, or a combination of information.

PROPOSAL

The applicant wishes to exclude the ALR portion of the parcel from the ALR, to allow for possible subdivision in the future (see Applicant`s Submission).

IMPLICATIONS

The property is in Electoral Area 'E'. There are no zoning or OCP bylaws in Area 'E', which if in place would provide local government policies, guidance or regulations on use or development of agricultural lands.

Notification Requirements

The applicant has submitted proof of sign posting, proof of delivery of notification to adjacent landowners, and copies of the newspaper advertisements in accordance with

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the requirements under Section 16(1) of the *Agricultural Reserve Use, Subdivision, and Procedure Regulation.*

A sign was posted on a facing Hulme Creek Road. Advertisements were placed in the Boundary Creek Times on January 30, 2014 and February 6, 2014. Registered letters were mailed to five adjacent property owners on January 22, 2014, and to a sixth adjacent owner on February 20, 2014. No comments have been received to date.

Issue Introduction

A staff report from Goran Denkovski - Engineering and Safety Coordinator, regarding the results of the Trail Regional Airport underground storage tank removal project.

History/Background Factors

Ownership of the Airport was recently transferred to the City of Trail from the Regional District Kootenay Boundary (RDKB). As a condition of sale, two underground storage tanks (UST) were required to be removed.

A Phase 1 Environment Site Assessment (ESA) was completed for the Site by the City of Trail in April 2012 as a due diligence exercise prior to the sale of the airport. It identified eight (8) Areas of Potential Environmental Concern (APECs) including the two Avgas UST's. From that report, the RDKB retained Bear Environmental Limited to complete the necessary activities to remove the AvGas UST's.

Both UST's were anticipated to be of single-wall steel construction, one out-of-service 3,500 gallon (~16,000 L) tank and one in-service 5,500 gallon (~25,000 L) tank. The objective of the project was to remove and dispose of the two Aviation Gas USTs, investigate potential contamination, provide confirmation of adequate remediation and backfill the excavation. Applicable site-specific criteria to the Site included reclamation activities related to commercial land use and the protection of groundwater flow to aquatic life and groundwater use for drinking water. All work was completed in general accordance with the policies, procedures and guidance for contaminated sites published by the British Columbia Ministry of Environment.

Prior to Bear Environmental mobilizing to the Site, the USTs were removed from service by airport personnel with the remaining contents pumped from the USTs to two temporary ASTs. FortisBC was retained by the RDKB to disconnect power from the fuel transfer area. The USTs were then removed over two days, with the excavation backfilled the following week. Two AvGas USTs (approximately 22,000 and 14,500 L) were decommissioned, excavated and removed from the Site. Visual, olfactory and soil vapour headspace evidence of fuel impacts were not observed. Confirmatory soil samples indicated fuel constituent concentrations less than laboratory detection limits and British Columbia Contaminated Site Regulation CL Soil Standards. The excavation was backfilled to grade with imported pit run sand and gravel. The former AvGAS USTs are dismissed as an APEC and no further investigation is recommended at this time.

Implications

This project was undertaken as a result of a condition of sale of the airport from the RDKB to the City of Trail. By completing this project, the RDKB has satisfied covenant 4.1(11) of the Airport Agreement.

BACKGROUND

The Site is the Trail Regional Airport. Ownership of the Airport was recently transferred to the City of Trail from the Regional District Kootenay Boundary (RDKB). A Phase 1 ESA was completed for the Site in April 2012 identifying eight (8) Areas of Potential Environmental Concern (APECs) including the two AvGas Underground Storage Tanks (USTs). The USTs were anticipated to be of single-wall steel construction with one out-of-service 3,500 gallon (~16,000 L) tank and one in-service 5,500 gallon (~25,000 L) tank. Further details on this APEC are provided below.

Prior to Bear Environmental mobilizing to the Site, the USTs were removed from service by airport personnel with the remaining contents pumped from the USTs to two temporary ASTs. Fortis was retained by the RDKB to disconnect power from the fuel transfer area.

OBJECTIVE

The objective of the project was to remove and dispose of the two AvGas USTs, investigate potential contamination, provide confirmation of adequate remediation, and backfill the excavation. Applicable site-specific criteria to the Site include commercial land use, and the protection of groundwater flow to aquatic life and groundwater use for drinking water.



SCOPE OF WORK AND METHODOLOGY

All work was completed in general accordance with the policies, procedures and guidance for contaminated sites published by the BC MoE. The USTs were removed over two days, March 3 and 4, 2014, with the excavation backfilled March 10, 2013. An airside escort was provided by Phil Molly of the Trail Regional Airport. The following tasks were completed to meet the project objectives:

- Preparing and implementing a health and safety plan (HASP).
- Conducting a BC1Call for underground utility clearance.
- Determining UST location and clearing for potential underground utilities with a Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) operated by Kootenay Subsurface Imaging of Trail, BC (KSSI).
- Mobilizing an excavator and tandem truck to the Site operated by Alpine Contracting of Trail, BC (Alpine), and daylighting the USTs.
- Fuel pump removal¹; and purging, cutting, and cleaning of the interior of the USTs by Quantum Remediation of Richmond, BC (Quantum).
- Manifesting, transport and disposal of one drum of used adsorbent pads and residual tank solids by Quantum.
- Excavation and removal of two single walled steel USTs by Alpine with the excavation barricaded/tapped pending backfill.
- Excavation of the concrete pump island and shed slab by Alpine and disposal at the Mckelvy Creek Landfill, Trail BC.
- Excavation and stockpiling of approximately 4 m³ soils impacted by a failed hydraulic cylinder on the excavator. Impacted soils were transported for off-site disposal by Alpine.
- Collection of confirmatory soil samples according to the BC MoE Technical Guidance 1, and couriering under chain of custody to CARO Analytical Services of Richmond BC for analysis of COPCs.
- Screening of analytical results against the BC MoE Contaminated Sites Regulation (CSR) soil standards applicable to Commercial Land Use (CL), and the protection of drinking water and aquatic life.
- Transportation and recycling of the USTs and associated steel piping by Columbia Recycling at 9330 Crown Rd GD, Trail, BC V1R 4L2.



¹ Fuel pumps were retained by City of Trail for future use.

- Transportation 91 tonnes of pit run sand and gravel by Interoute Construction from the Waneta Reload pit located south of the Site.
- Backfilling of the excavation to grade by Alpine compacting with the excavator bucket.
- Demobilizing all equipment from the Site, and preparing this report.

RESULTS

Two single-wall steel USTs formerly containing AvGas were purged, cleaned, excavated and removed from the Site. The tanks measured $6.4~m\times2.1~m$ diameter, and $5.2~m\times1.9~m$ diameter (approximately 22,000~L and 14,500~L). Upon purging and cutting open the tanks, the USTs were empty with minimal liquid and sediment inside. The USTs were cleaned with absorbent pads and all remaining tank contents and used pads removed, placed in a sealed steel drum, and transported off-site for disposal by Quantum. Both tanks were in good condition with no holes, pitting or excessive corrosion observed. The tanks and associated steel piping was transported offsite by Columbia Recycling.

The resultant excavation was approximately 9.7 m x 9.8 m and included the pump island area. No visual, olfactory or vapour headspace evidence of fuel impacts were identified within the excavation soils. Confirmatory soil samples collected from the excavation walls (N, W, S, and E), excavation base (B1 and B2), and excavated soil used for backfill (BF) were analyzed for COPCs. Concentrations of LEPH, HEPH, PAH, BTEX and VPH were reported less than the laboratory method detection limits and applicable CSR CL Soil Standards. All samples were also analyzed for lead, indicating concentrations less than the CSR CL Soil Standard.

A hydraulic oil spill estimated at less than 20 L occurred during backfilling the excavation. Soils exhibiting visual, olfactory and soil vapour headspace evidence of oil impacts were excavated and stockpiled within polyethylene sheeting. A confirmatory sample (B3) collected at the base of the removed soils indicated COPC concentrations less than the applicable CSR CL. Approximately 4 m³ of soil were removed from the Site by Alpine for offsite disposal.

The excavation was backfilled to grade with 91 tonnes of pit run sand and gravel imported from the Waneta Reload gravel pit located south of the Site.

Photographs documenting the project are included in Appendix 1. Analytical results are summarized in Table 1 at the end of this report with laboratory certificates included in Appendix 2. Excavation details and sample locations are illustrated on Figure 1.

CONCLUSION

Two AvGas USTs (approximately 22,000 and 14,500 L) were decommissioned, excavated and removed from the Site. Visual, olfactory and soil vapour headspace evidence of fuel impacts were not observed. Confirmatory soil samples indicated fuel constituent concentrations less than



the laboratory detection limits and CSR CL Soil Standards. The excavation was backfilled to grade with imported pit run sand and gravel. The former AvGAS USTs are dismissed as an APEC and no further investigation is recommended at this time.


